January 14, 1943 - January 25, 2022

On January 25th, 2022, the world lost a bright light when Charles Lee "Charley" Worley passed away after a brief illness. Charley was welcomed into this world by Irene (Rowe) and Wayne Worley and older brother Bob on January 14th, 1943.

Charley grew up in Butte, attending Greeley Elementary, East Junior High, and graduated from Butte High School in 1961. While attending Butte High he met and married the love of his life, Karen Griffith. Through this love Charley and Karen welcomed son Wayne and daughter Bonnie.

If you knew Charley, you knew of his amazing work ethic that started at a young age as a paper delivery boy. He worked various jobs in his young life before starting a career at the Anaconda Company. While working for the Anaconda Company Charley started an appliance repair business on the side, "Worley Refridgeration". After the mine shut down Charley went to work for Butte-Silver Bow, where he became the "Ice Meister" making the best ice in the world at the High Altitude Sports Center. Charley spent countless hours perfecting the ice for the world class skaters which resulted in many world records to be set at the rink. This probably had to do to the fact that Charley was a fantastic speed skater himself, so he understood the ice. Charley was even asked a couple of times to run the Zamboni at the Olympics, but he politely declined. The summers were spent repairing sprinkler systems, building park equipment, and maintaining the parks of Butte for all to enjoy. His granddaughters, Rachel and Leena, were lucky enough to spend a few

summers working and learning along-side their Grandpa.

If you needed something fixed or built, Charley was the man to do it. The man could fix anything and everything, and if he couldn't, he would find a book to figure it out. If Charley couldn't fix it, it really was broke. Charley was responsible for many remodels and projects for his family and friends. If Charley wasn't working, you could find him in the woods, throwing a line out, or riding his motorcycle into a mountain lake. His favorite place in the world was the "cabin". Countless hours were spent making memories with the people he loved most. Getting firewood, catching grasshoppers for fishing, picking wild strawberries, roasting a hot dog over the fire, steak fries, and just enjoying the beauty of Montana.

Charley took great pride in having one of the nicest maintained yards in town. The grass was always perfect, trees were trimmed and beautiful blend of flowers were always in bloom. Charley's garden produced a varied of crops that supplied dinner for family, friends, and the neighborhood rabbits. His raspberry bushes produced gallons upon gallons of berries that were shared with family and friends or enjoyed in the yard over a big scoop of vanilla ice cream.

Family was one of Charley's greatest blessings. He looked forward to morning coffees with his son, Wayne and haircuts from his daughter Bonnie. Charley loved traveling around to his grandchildren's sporting events. Countless hours were spent traveling the state and country to softball games and tournaments, volleyball games, cross country meets, track meets, and wrestling matches. Grandpa Charley graduated to GG Charley when Nick was born. A special bond was made between GG Charley and his boys that was unbreakable. Nick and David loved going to GG's house to spend time in the yard helping or in the garage "fixing things".

Charley was preceded in death by his parents, beloved Aunt and Uncle Georgia Pankey and Charles Worley, brother-in-law Donny Griffith numerous cousins and dear friends.

He is survived by his loving wife of 60 years, Karen; son and daughter-in-law,

Sending Karen, Wayne, Bonnie, Bob and families hugs and prayers. We'll talk soon.

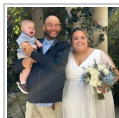
